

Dear Sirs,

I am extremely concerned that despite Parliament providing for an incentive to guarantee access to justice ' under section 40 of the Crime and Courts Act, the relevant provisions have not yet been brought into effect and this despite the Prime Minister's election pledge and his statement to the Leveson Inquiry, "I will never forget meeting with the Dowler family in Downing Street to run through the terms of this inquiry with them and to hear what they had been through. [...] I'll never forget that and that's the test of all this".

You will readily recall that the Leveson Report stated exactly what should happen if the press ignored its recommendations and refused to comply.

Lord Leveson pithily summed up the situation with his remark, 'I cannot, and will not, recommend another last chance saloon for the press.'

I consider that it is your duty to emphasise to Parliament that it is *again* being flouted by immensely powerful institutions and individuals. Lord Denning said many years ago. "To every subject of this land, however powerful, I would use Thomas Fuller's words over three hundred years ago, 'Be ye never so high, the law is above you'". It is the duty of Parliament to protect the sanctity of the law.
